


## DANIEL DUNN

### THE REV DANIEL DUNN

The Rev Daniel Dunn who will commence his pastorate of the Tunbridge Wells Primitive Methodist Church the third Sunday in July is a native of Tipton, Staff, midway between Wolverhampton and Birmingham where Dr ?? And Dr Dale exercised such mighty ministries and generally influenced hundreds of young men. Mr Dunn's ministerial life, after an earlier business life, has covered a considerable variety of experiences. His first circuit after leaving home was Pontypool, Mon where he laboured among the miners chiefly. He was then sent to Manchester and learnt to know the cotton-workers and manufacturers. Then he laboured in the Bilston circuit adjoining his native town. His next circuit was in Leeds, where for about four years he worked strenuously and happily among the woolen-workers and manufacturers. Next he spent five years in Brighton as Pastor of one church and learned something of the opportunities and difficulties of the church and ministry at a fashionable seaside town. His next circuit was Brampton near Carlisle an agricultural district where his work lay chiefly among the farmers. His next ministry in High Wycombe finishes in July. There Mr Dunn has laboured abundantly and happily among the chair-makers in the town and the farmers in the villages. Mrs Dunn also takes an active interest in her husbands work.

Daniels's "missionary" enthusiasm was effective and recognised:-

### **Missionary Revenue.**

Sir,--I am fully persuaded that your correspondent, David Lewis, has hit the nail on the head, and that where the minister is in full sympathy with the missionary cause there will be a corresponding increase in the revenue. I have just returned from a missionary "round" in the Birmingham Third Circuit—one of the best "rounds" I ever attended. The minister, Rev. Daniel Dunn, is a red-hot missionary enthusiast, and his people generously respond to his earnest appeals. When the minister announced on Thursday evening that the magnificent sum of £81 had been raised this year there was great rejoicing. This means an increase of £30 on last year. Well done, Birmingham Third, and well done, Daniel Dunn, for having led the circuit so nobly in this best of all causes! It is cheering to add that the spiritual results of the services have been most encouraging, several persons deciding for Christ on the Sunday evening.—Yours, etc.,
